

He then transferred to Henley in Arden where he worked as a Community Beat Officer and was then promoted to a Sergeant on Response at Learnington. After working in this busy role he moved to become Sergeant of the Safer Neighbourhoods Team at Alcester.

Bob worked with his team there serving the community until the vacancy for a Sergeant for the Rural Crime Team came up. He applied and successfully got the job and has been a major part of the team ever since, seeing it evolve and grow covering the whole of the county and making a difference to our rural communities.

Events



The team have attended national events in Staffordshire and Leamington increasing their knowledge on dealing with vehicle crime and wildlife crime, as well as networking with other forces sharing intelligence and best practice.

At the National Wildlife Conference the Rural Crime Team were asked to do a short presentation on the successful results of the team in this area showing the breadth of the different types of crime and investigations that we deal with. PC Andy Steventon gave the short presentation to a packed hall of 200 officers and partner agencies.



Training Day

As well as training our own specialist officers in the Rural Crime Team it is important that we also provide advice and guidance to officers in other departments in our force that may be the first point of contact with a victim of rural crime. The hands on training provided at a farm on agricultural vehicles of all types, livestock, equine, wildlife and heritage crime is a packed day that is really popular and we now have another 24 officers who will become ambassadors on rural crime on their shifts and beat areas.

This stolen Ifor Williams trailer was recovered after RCT officers conducted routine checks on it whilst in attendance at an unrelated incident near Barnacle.

The trailer was reported stolen back in 2008 from Warwickshire. Although this was 13 years ago the owner was still pleased to have it returned as sadly it was not insured when taken.



The caravan at the top was confirmed stolen after officers were concerned at the lack of serial numbers and made further enquiries.

The caravan in the bottom picture was recovered by our colleagues in Northern Ireland who intercepted it and after doing checks found it had been stolen in Warwickshire back in September



Partnership Working



The team with colleagues from the Safer Neighbourhood Teams at Wellesbourne, Southam and Stratford, plus partners at Datatag and TER (The Equipment Register) did an operation checking plant, trailers and caravans. It was a great opportunity to give crime prevention advice and engage with owners of these potentially vulnerable vehicles. A good proactive day with positive feedback from the public.

Rural Crime Specials Tackle Off Road Bike Issues in North Warwickshire

The Rural Crime Team Specials have been busy out and about in North Warwickshire where there have been issues regarding off road bikes. Whilst patrolling at the weekend a call came in of concerns re off road bikes at a disused mining site in North Warwickshire. The location covers a number of acres so the officers utilised the rural drone and identified the spot the bikes were in. This led to 2 being seized and section 59 notices being issued.

At a separate location in North Warwickshire a call came in of an off road bike causing issues in the area. The Rural Specials responded stopping the rider and seizing his pit bike.

Officers received a concerned call from a member of the public regarding a pony loose on a main road. It was taken to a nearby location for safety and checking to find the owner.

The Rural Crime Team carry microchip scanners in their vehicles and were able to check the pony that was chipped and ensure it got back with the owner.

Horses and ponies by law have to be microchipped.

AVIAN INFLUENZA PREVENTION ZONE

REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL POULTRY AND CAPTIVE BIRD KEEPERS

- Keep free-ranging birds in fenced areas to minimise contact with wild birds, neigbouring poultry or captive birds.
 - Inspect outdoor areas, removing wild bird contaminants like faeces, feathers and wild bird carcases.
- Fence off or put netting over areas of standing water or ponds.
- Provide feed and water undercover, so wild birds can't access it.
 Make your premises unattractive to wild birds. Use bird scarers, foils or streamers.
- Keep ducks and geese separate from other poultry.
- Store bedding under cover to reduce the risk of contamination.
 - Clean and disinfect footwear before and after tending to your birds. If you own more than 50 birds, place foot dips containing Government approved disinfectant at all entry and exit points.
- Clean and disinfect hard surfaces regularly.
- Clean and disinfect equipment and vehicles to avoid disease spread between premises.
- Minimise the movement of people, vehicles and equipment to and from bird areas and keep records of movements.
- Keep records of poultry, captive bird and egg movements.
- Maintain buildings that house birds to prevent water ingress

Ensure pest control is effective.

WILDLIFE

Following a number of hare coursing incidents around the county the Rural Crime Team have been patrolling the main areas where reports have come in.

Warwickshire is part of Operation Galileo where 28 forces from around the country are working together to tackle this offence.

This week our team have been working with Leicestershire Police doing cross border patrols together to deal with hare coursing and other offences affecting our rural communities.

Monday 29th November, 2021. From this date it will
