HORSE & EQUIPMENT RECORD FORM

If your horse and/or equipment is lost or stolen it will help the Police and other authorities to identify your property.

This document is intended to help you and the Police identify your horse and property if they go missing and help prove ownership.

Report any theft to the Police. Ensure you are given a crime reference number and write it down.

Inform Warwickshire Horse Watch who will put an alert out to all members.

If your horse or property is registered with a security company, i.e. NECD, SmartWater, Farm Key, FreezeMark, Immobilise, etc., notify them immediately.

If you bought your tack or trailer new and your details are registered with the company against a unique serial number, i.e. Ifor Williams , Barnsby, Black Country Saddles etc, advise them your property has been stolen so if they are asked to re-register the item in somebody else's name they can contact you and the Police.

Check websites, auctions, dealers, press and Horse magazines. Provide details to local yards and riding clubs so that as many people as possible are looking out for your property.

Contact the local press for their help with publicity.

Remember if your horse or property cannot be identified they are unlikely to be returned to you. Make sure your horses are freeze branded or micro-chipped. Tack, rugs, tools, trailers and lorries are post coded, micro-chipped or are forensically marked.

Use as many sheets as needed for each horse, tack and number of vehicles you have.

TAKING A PHOTOGRAPH OF YOUR HORSE/PONY

1. Take a photograph of your horse standing upright from both sides, showing his/her full body.
2. Take a photograph of your horse from the front with his/her full body showing.
3. Take a photograph of your horse from the rear showing his/her full body.
4. Take a close up picture of your horse's face showing their markings, e.g. blaze, star, whirls, etc.
5. Take a close up picture of your horse's front legs showing any markings, i.e. white socks, etc. *Ensure the hooves are clean & with no hoof oil so any unique markings can be seen.*
6. Take a close up picture of your horse's back legs showing any markings, i.e. white socks, etc. *Ensure the hooves are clean & with no hoof oil so any unique markings can be seen.*
7. Take a close up picture of any markings, scars, brands, whirls, etc which would distinguish your horse.

Take these pictures of your horse in the summer and the winter as horses change their coat or are clipped and can look very different depending on the time of year.

When taking these photographs it is recommended to do it with a minimum of two people, one person holding the horse whilst the other takes the photographs.

Always keep at a safe distance when taking these photographs so you do not get injured if the horse spooks or moves suddenly, especially on the closer shots.

Take the photographs outside in a secure large space in good weather, this stops the horse being spooky in inclement weather, prevents the need for a flash and ensures you have good clear pictures. If you are on a yard or a member of a club consider having one day where all the horses are done so everyone can help.

If you have a particularly nervous horse try using the camera first from a distance so he/she gets used to it and distract with feed whilst you are taking the photographs.

TAKING PHOTOGRAPHS OF YOUR TACK

1. Try and take photographs of your tack in good light, preferably outside.
2. Put your tack on a safe and secure object such as a saddle stand, gate or fence where it will not fall off or get damaged and you can see the whole of the equipment.
3. Take a photograph of the whole of the item of tack, if a saddle from each side.
4. Take a close up photograph of any distinguishing marks, i.e. badges, emblems, manufactures name, marks, scratches, serial numbers or security marking such as postcoding.
5. Record on the record form individual details for each saddle or item of tack you wish to record.
6. Keep a list of your tack and approx value.
7. If you have receipts keep them as proof of value and ownership.
8. Don't forget when recording details of tack includes all items, e.g. with a bridle the bit and martingale, with a saddle the stirrups, leathers, girth, saddle cloths and numnahs etc.
9. Review the security of your tack when at home and on the yard - see www.warwickshire-horsecwatch.co.uk for Crime Prevention Advice.
10. Don't forget to keep your tack safe when at shows.

PHOTOGRAPH OF YOUR TACK

PHOTOGRAPHS & DETAILS OF YOUR VEHICLES

This includes horse boxes, trailers, 4 x 4 vehicles, tractors, quads or any other vehicle you own.

1. When taking a photograph of your vehicle ensure it is clean so distinguishing details can be seen.
2. Take the photograph in good light preferably outside.
3. Ensure you have plenty of space so you can get the whole of the vehicle in the relevant shots.
4. Take a photograph of your vehicle from both sides, plus the front and rear ensuring the whole of the vehicle is in the shot.
5. Take a photograph of any distinguishing or identifiable marks including chasis numbers, vehicle registration plates, postcode or forensic marking, stickers or labels, logos or livery.
6. If you have post coded your roof and it is safe to do so take a photograph of this also.
7. Record all details with the pictures relevant to the vehicle including any unique features, security markings etc.
